

College and Career Readiness Standards True or False?

Every teacher teaches exactly the same lesson at the exact same time.

The three instructional shifts in the CCR include: longer breaks, higher pay, and less supervision.


The CCR was designed to meet the needs of high school students, not to support the needs of adult learners.



The CCR Standards and English Language Learners

- The CCR Standards will be used broadly throughout the field of adult education.
- They describe the <u>continuum of skills and</u> <u>knowledge</u> that adults need for college and career readiness, regardless of language background.
- They <u>do not address</u> practices or strategies specific to supporting the needs of English language learners.






Who developed the CCR Standards? Where did the CCR Standards come from?

The CCR Standards (College and Career Readiness Standards) were developed by **OCTAE** to help prepare **adult** students for **college** and **career** readiness.


OCTAE=Office of Career, Technical and Adult Education





What do the CCR Standards consist of?


The CCR Standards have four major strands. They are reading, writing, speaking and listening, and language. Each strand has several anchor standards. Each anchor standard has level specific standards.





What is the purpose of the CCR Standards?


The CCR Standards is not a curriculum. It's not a lesson plan. The CCR is a set of **standards** that **OCTAE** has developed to guide instructors as they assist students in developing the **skills** needed for college and career readiness.





What are the three major instructional shifts in the CCR Standards?

There are three major instructional shifts in the CCR Standards. They are in **text complexity** (using academic language in reading, writing and speaking), using citation of **evidence**, and in reading informational texts to develop content **knowledge**.







Connecting the Bending and Lifting Activity to CCR Reading Anchor Standard 1

When a student reads a text and gives **specific evidence from the text**, which CCR Reading Anchor Standard is being applied?

CCR Reading Anchor Standard 1:

Read closely to determine what the text says explicitly and to make logical inferences from it; cite specific textual evidence when writing or speaking to support conclusions drawn from the text.

Connecting the Bending and Lifting Activity to CCR Speaking and Listening Anchor Standard 1

When students **collaborate** with different classmates, listening to others and providing their own answers, which CCR Speaking and Listening Anchor Standard is being applied?

CCR Speaking and Listening Anchor Standard 1:

Prepare for and participate effectively in a range of conversations and collaborations with diverse partners, building on others' ideas and expressing their own clearly and persuasively.


The Career in My Future: Goal-Setting Phase

Connecting the Career in My Future to the CCR Reading Anchor Standards

When students **do research** about the career in their future on the Internet, and they **read different formats** (lists, paragraphs, graphs, charts and sometimes watch videos about the job), which CCR Reading Anchor Standard is being applied?

CCR Reading Anchor Standard 7:

Integrate and evaluate content presented in diverse media and formats, including visually and quantitatively, as well as in words.

Connecting the Career in My Future to the CCR Writing Anchor Standards

When a student takes notes during online research, which CCR Writing Anchor Standard is being applied?

CCR Writing Anchor Standard 8:

Gather relevant information from multiple print and digital sources, assess the credibility and accuracy of each source, and integrate the information while avoiding plagiarism.
