

Filter Frenzy

1. Open a new Photoshop page that is 8" x 8" and at 300 ppi. Go to VIEW and choose "SNAP".
2. Open a photo of a person (face). Choose the crop tool and set the information in the options bar to be: Width: 2", height: 2", and Resolution: 300. Crop a portion of the face being sure to include a variety of colors. Apply the crop.
3. Drag the cropped photo to the blank page and place it in the upper, left corner. It will "snap" into place when you get close.
4. Repeat Step 3 and place the portrait next to the first one in the top row.
5. Continue place portraits until you have four rows and four columns of portraits. You will notice each time you drag a portrait, it create a new layer.
6. Leave the first portrait the way it is (it should be Layer 1.) Then choose each layer and affect the image using one or a combination of filters. You don't want to totally loose the image of the face, but you want to affect a change - minor or major. Use the Record Sheet to document which filter(s) you used for each portrait.
7. Continue to go through the various portraits, changing each with a different filter effect. As you work through the portraits, consider the overall image also. You want to end up with each portrait as an interesting image, but also, the overall image as aesthetically pleasing as possible.
