

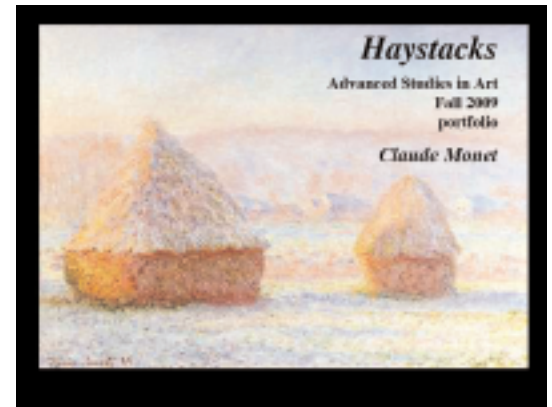
Digital Portfolio

As part of this class (and for your final exam) you will create a digital portfolio that illustrates the work you did in the semester. Using PowerPoint, you will illustrate all your work and background information. Here is what your digital portfolio must include:

Required slides

Opening slide with:

- Title of portfolio (or identified as “Portfolio”)
- Name of class – Advanced Studies in Art
- Year of class – Fall 2009
- The word “portfolio” if not used in title
- Your name



Explanation slide(s):

This slide or slides explains your portfolio. Much of the information can be taken from your Final Written Commentary. It needs to give the viewer insight into why you did this art, how you did this art, and what you learned during the process of making the art. It can be personal, but also give factual information to the viewer.



Art slides:

These are the slides of your projects. There should be ten. Along with the image should be the title of the piece (or “untitled”), the media used, and the size.



Optional slides

Background images:

If you feel it is important to provide some background information you can include a slide that shows that. Images that show where you worked, the subject of your work, etc. can be included.

Details:

You can include details of individual pieces. If you think it is important to see a close-up of some part of a project, you can add a slide with this information. Just be sure to include text to tell the viewer what you are showing and why.

Closing slide:

You can end your digital portfolio with a closing slide. If you have a final thought, or want to “wrap up” the concept you have shown, create a slide to end the portfolio.

Remember, since this counts as your final exam, it will count for 20% of your grade for the class. Do not feel obligated to create some complicated “show.” You just want to be sure the digital portfolio does a good job of representing you and your work. If you need to borrow a digital camera or need help with PowerPoint, see the instructor.
