Computer access: On line activities, exercises, and resources form an important part of this course. So you have to have access to the internet. There are many computer stations around campus that you can use.

Sequence: Successful completion of this course is the equivalent of completing the first two courses in the Latin sequence which consists of

Latin 110, Elementary Latin	Latin 120, Elementary Latin
Latin 230, Intermediate Latin	Latin 240, Intermediate Latin

This sequence fulfills the foreign language requirement of the College of Arts and Sciences

Course Objectives:

The primary goal of the course is to introduce you to the Latin language in order to help you reach the ultimate goal of communicating directly with the Romans by reading the words they left behind. Along the way you will also gain skills in listening, speaking, and writing the language and you will learn about many aspects of Roman culture. You will also gain greater insight into the workings of languages in general and English in particular and you will find your English vocabulary expanding noticeably

Student Requirements:

Due to the intensive nature of this course, missing class or not doing homework is academic suicide. There is simply too much too soon too quickly for you to take a haphazard approach to this course. If showing up and being regular in your work habits is difficult for you then you do not belong in this class. Frankly, I do not recommend the course for freshmen. A course like this is a harsh introduction to college.

I will not be assigning an attendance grade. But be advised if I do not give make up work, I don't grade late homework, and I adamantly refuse to teach the same thing to you personally because you chose to be elsewhere instead of in class. If you can't do the time, don't do the crime. Bad Boy, Bad Boy.....what ya' gonna do, when they come for you, unh huh.

- Participation/preparedness: A grade will be entered everyday. You receive a 0 if not there, 1 if there and unprepared, 2 if present and prepared. Note: prepared does not mean you have everything letter perfect but that you have tried to assimilate what we did the day before. You'll get to drop the 2 lowest grades of this type.
- Quizzes: You get to drop the 2 lowest. They are announced, but only the class prior. It is your responsibility to have a contact person if you miss class. Warning! There are TONS of quizzes.
- Final (date to be announced, but during final exam period)
- Daily homework. Sometimes you correct it and pass it in. Sometimes you pass it in and I grade it. Sometimes we do it orally and don't pass it in but it still counts for a grade. But since it can affect your participation and preparedness grade you can count on homework for which you are responsible and graded every day. Homework is graded on a 10 point scale. Again, this means you made a serious attempt at the homework, not that you got it all right

Policies:

Quizzes and tests missed for university approved reasons will be given a makeup. Otherwise, the grade is zero and you have to use that as one of your drops. Makeups for the final will only be given for university approved reasons and the instructor must be informed ahead of time in writing and suitable documentation is provided.
