Literature and Composition II Demonstrative Speech Explanation

Requirements of Speech:

- You should prepare a **two to two and a half minute** speech. You should follow the outline below. Your speech needs to be introduced adequately, have a clear general purpose, address three specific points or details, and conclude effectively. You will also be graded on your physical and vocal delivery. See the attached rubric for more specific points you will be graded on.
- You need to demonstrate or show the class how to do something. Mrs. Anzalone will provide an example of a demonstrative speech in class.
- You need to use a visual aide. The visual aide can be tangible (ex: a guitar, a scrapbook, a camera, etc.) or it can be intangible (ex: a photograph of the object, a poster of the object, etc.). However, you must have a visual aide in the speech at some point.
- You are allowed to use an outline during your presentation. However, the outline must be written in no more than **four word phrases only**. You cannot write in complete sentences. Your outline will be checked prior to when you give the speech. We do this so that you will not be tempted to read off of the outline. You are only using the outline as a visual queue to remember what you planned to say.

Due Dates:

- Your outline is due on **Tuesday, May 13**. The outline must be typed in 14 point Times New Roman font and at least 1.5" spaced.
- Speeches will be performed in class on Wednesday, May 14; Thursday, May 15; and Friday, May 16. Students may use his or her outline to give the speech. Mrs. Anzalone will choose the speech order at random.
