William Shakespeare - Friends, Romans, countrymen (from Antony in *Julius Caesar* Act III.ii Line 70)

Friends, Romans, countrymen, lend me your ears; 70	When that the poor have cried, Caesar hath wept:
I come to bury Caesar, not to praise him.	Ambition should be made of sterner stuff:
The evil that men do lives after them;	Yet Brutus says he was ambitious; 90
The good is oft interred with their bones;	And Brutus is an honourable man.
So let it be with Caesar. The noble Brutus	You all did see that on the Lupercal
Hath told you Caesar was ambitious: 75	I thrice presented him a kingly crown,
If it were so, it was a grievous fault,	Which he did thrice refuse: was this ambition?
And grievously hath Caesar answer'd it.	Yet Brutus says he was ambitious; 95
Here, under leave of Brutus and the rest -	And, sure, he is an honourable man.
For Brutus is an honourable man;	I speak not to disprove what Brutus spoke,
So are they all, all honourable men - 80	But here I am to speak what I do know.
Come I to speak in Caesar's funeral.	You all did love him once, not without cause:
He was my friend, faithful and just to me:	What cause withholds you then, to mourn for him?100
But Brutus says he was ambitious;	O judgment! thou art fled to brutish beasts,
And Brutus is an honourable man.	And men have lost their reason. Bear with me;
He hath brought many captives home to Rome 85	My heart is in the coffin there with Caesar,
Whose ransoms did the general coffers fill:	And I must pause till it come back to me. 104
