Reading Comprehension

You will be given two passages from the following list which we have covered in class, and asked to answer questions concerning scansion and meter, figures of speech, interpretation, and translation. Make sure to review the passages in question, noting the important details and themes in the readings.

- Catullus [39](#), [101](#) (CLC pp.152, 154)
- Pliny [X.17 a](#), [X.19](#), [X.34](#) (CLC pp. 124, 128, 133)

Translation

You will be given two passages from the following poems and asked to provide a **good, literal** translation (keep tenses consistent, active and passive must be translated correctly). Make sure to re-read these poems, seeking to **understand** the text, not just memorize it.

- Ovid, Ars Amatoria [I.469-478](#)
- Vergil, Aeneid [III.192-206](#)

Essays

You will be given two passages and asked to write two **short** essays. Remember that you will be asked to refer specifically to the Latin throughout the poem to support the points you make in your essay. All Latin words must be copied or their line numbers provided AND they must be translated or paraphrased closely enough so that it is clear you understand the Latin.
