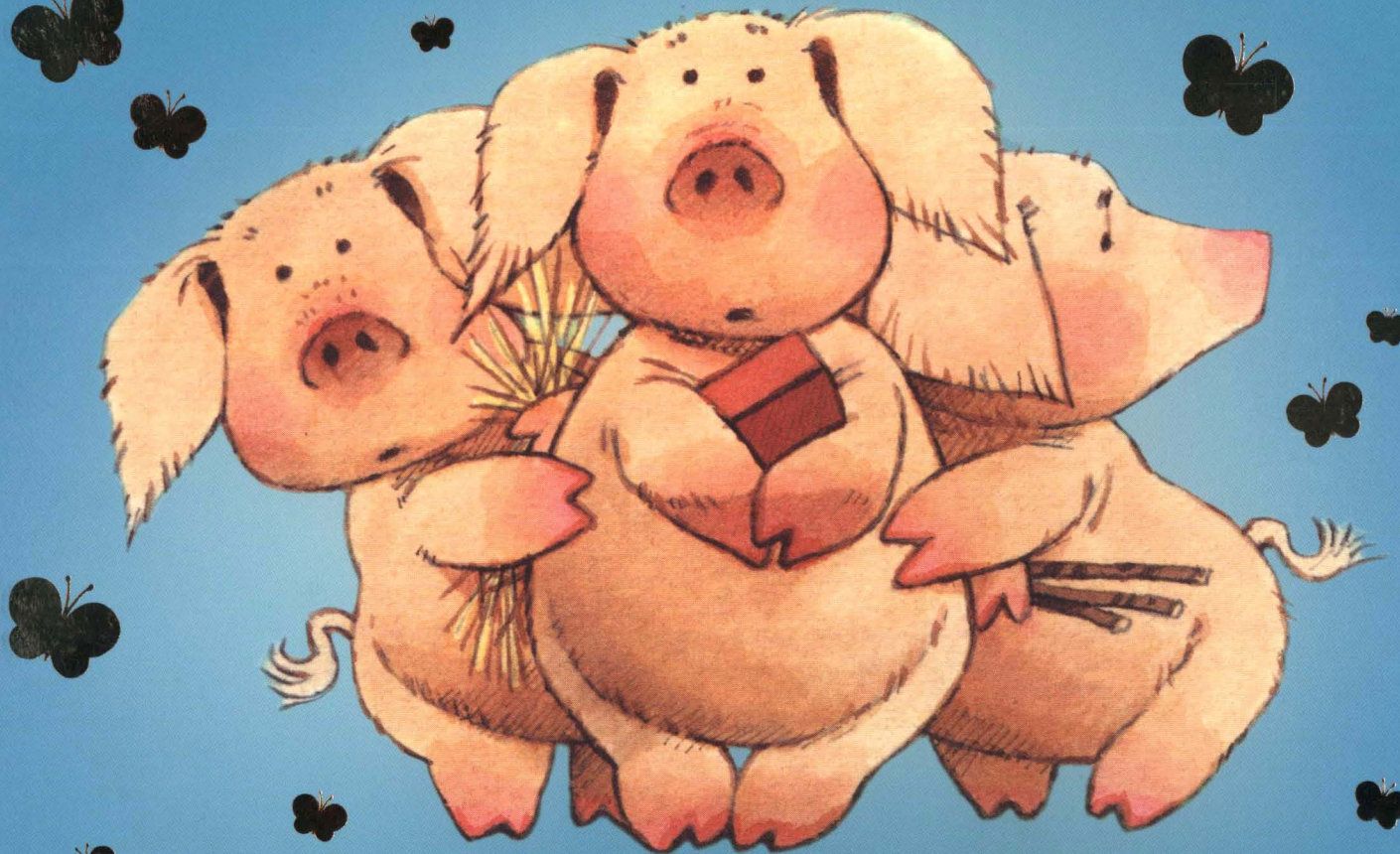

The second little Pig meets a man.



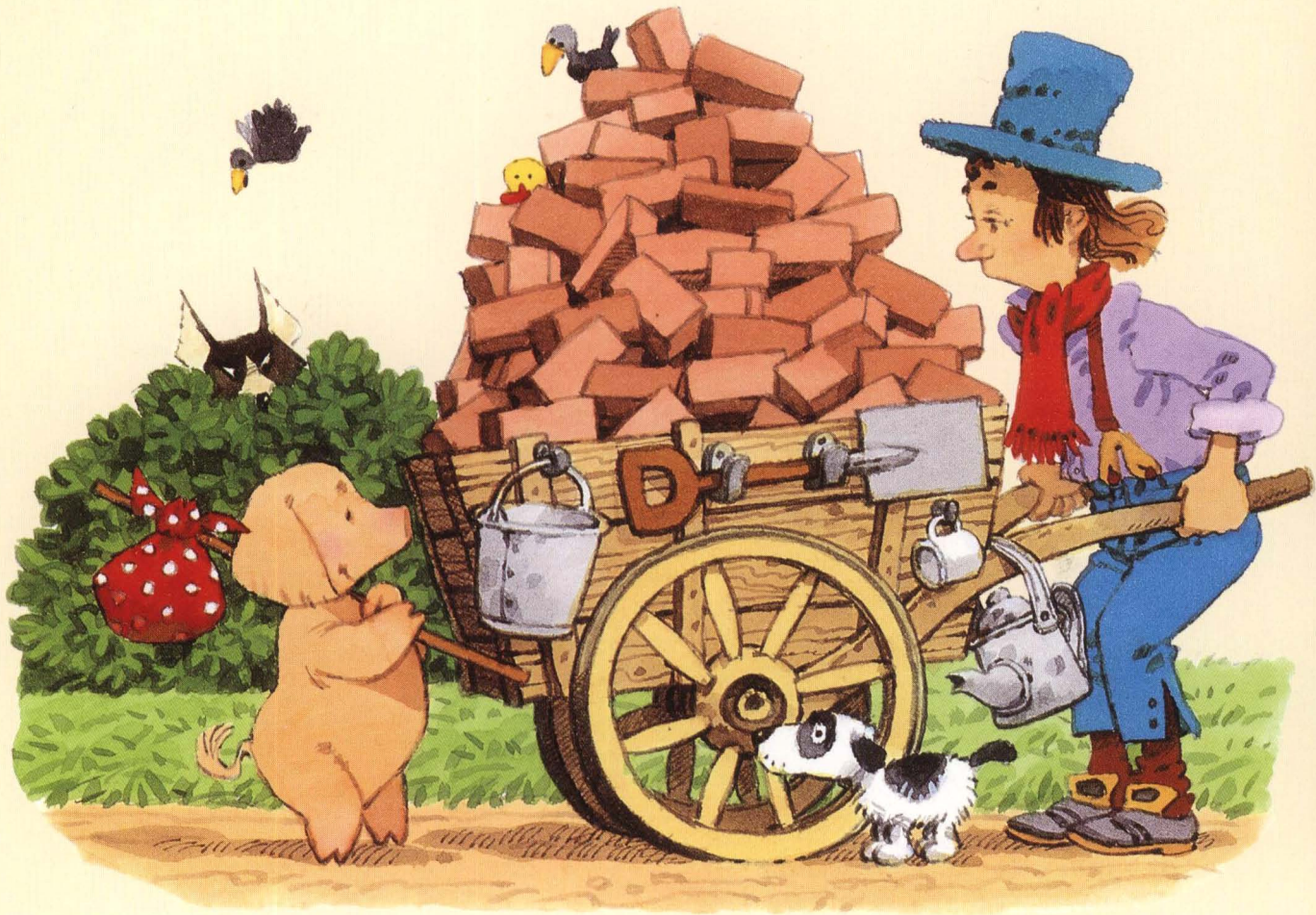
He has a big load of sticks. "Please give me some sticks," says the little Pig. The man gives him lots of big sticks.

The little Pig builds his house.



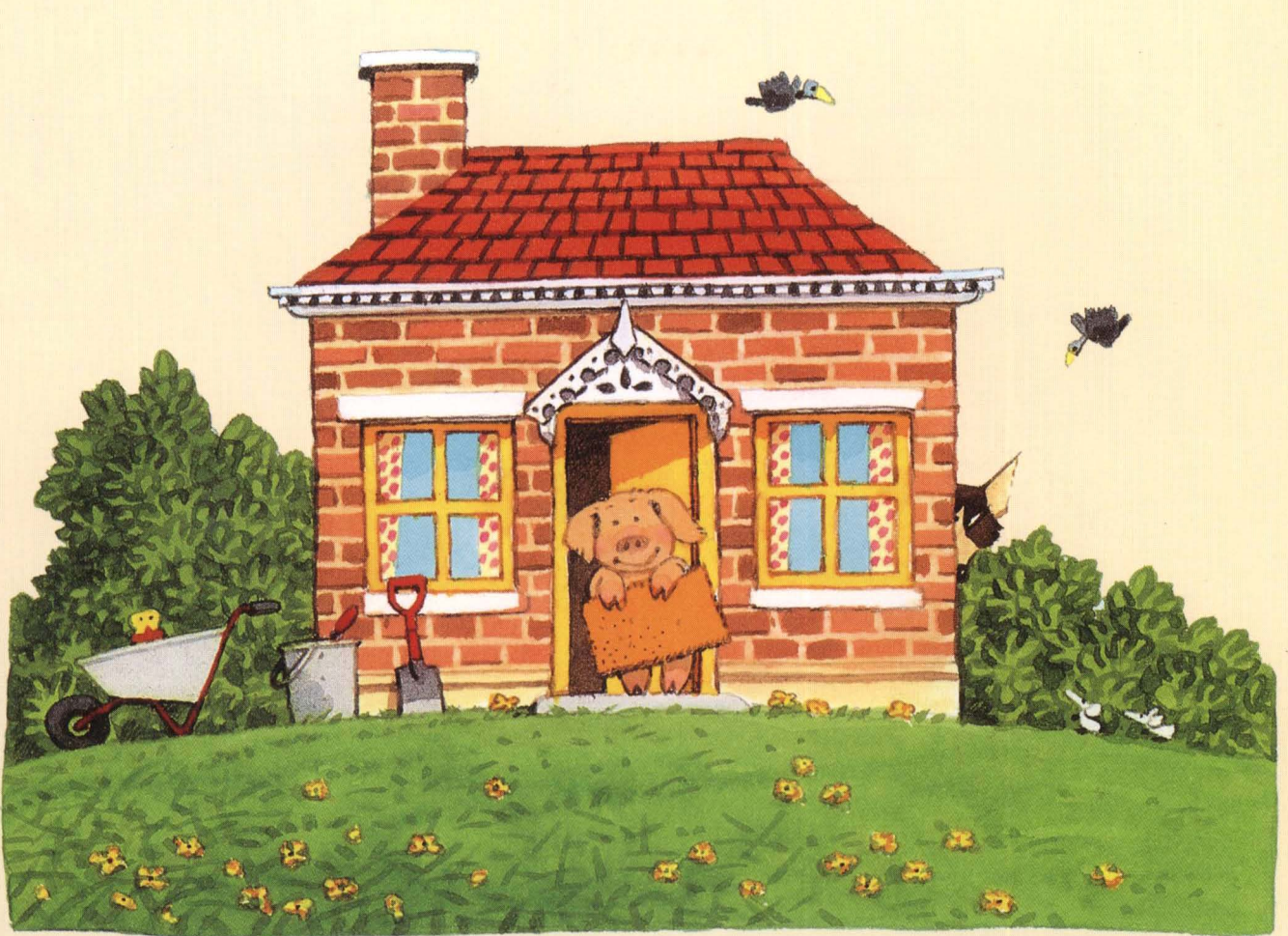
It has strong walls, two doors, two windows and a chimney.

He has a load of bricks. "Please give me some bricks," says the little Pig. The man gives him all he needs for his house.

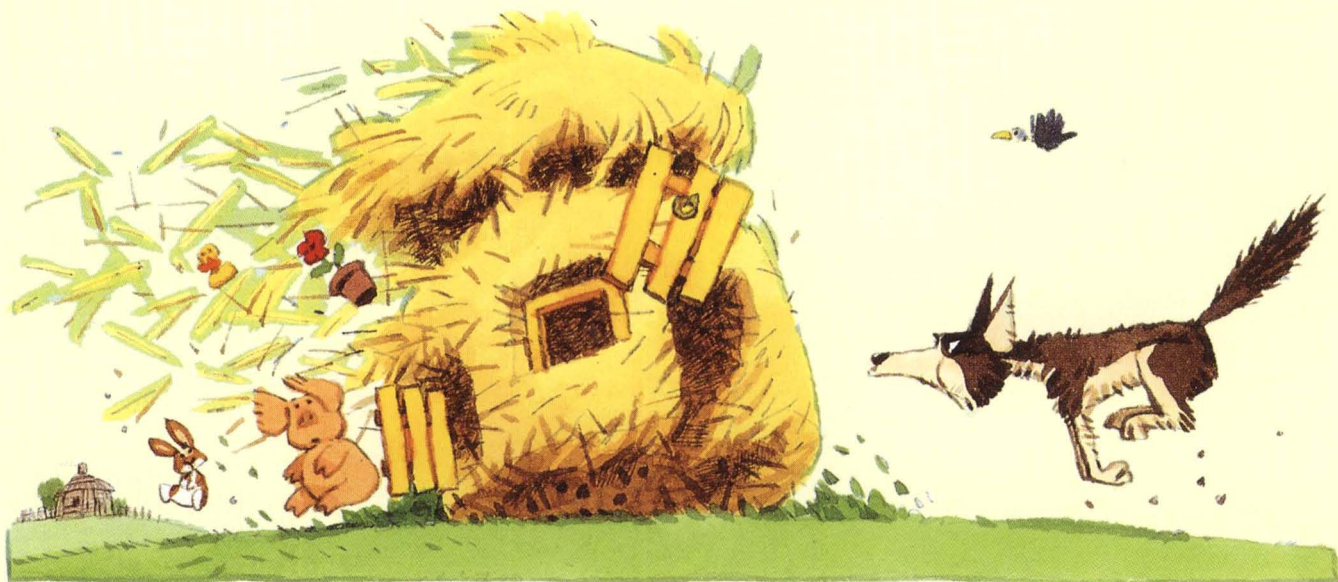
The little Pig builds his house.

The Wolf comes to the straw house.



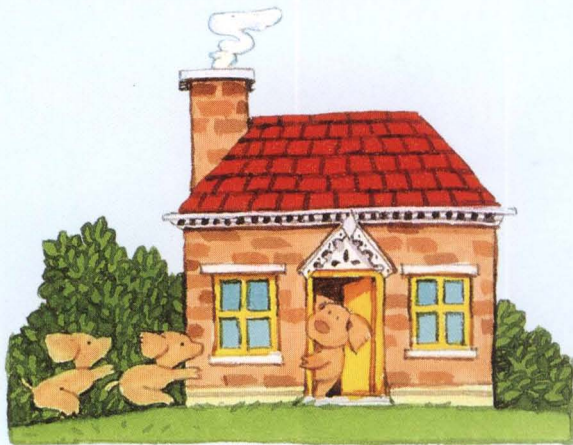
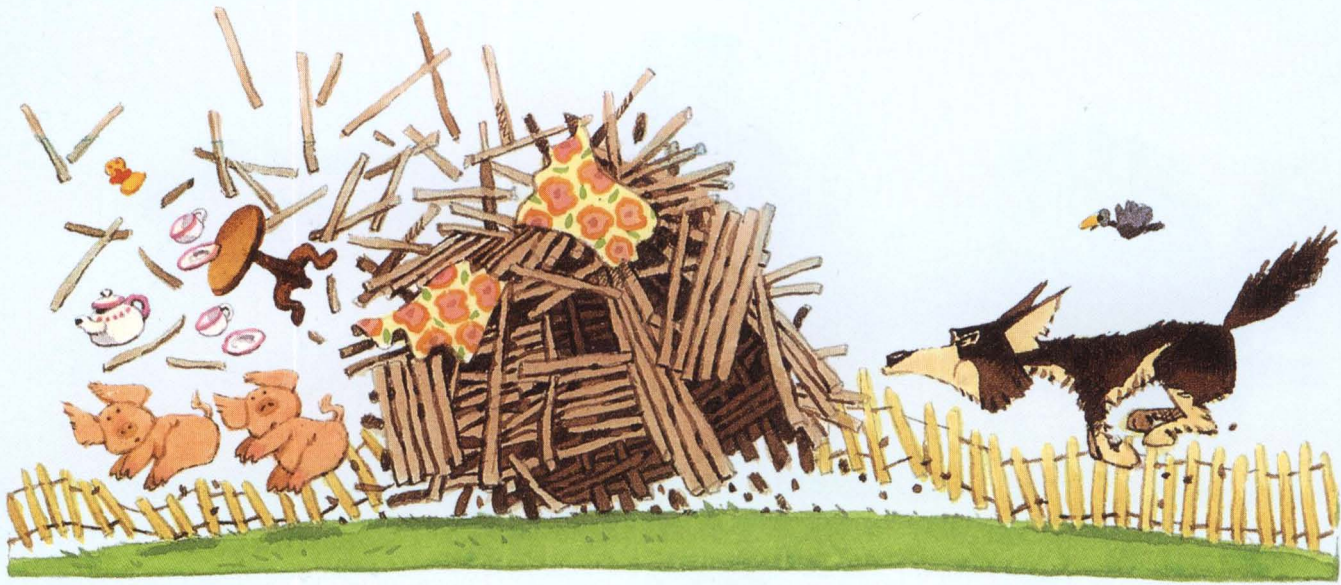
"Little Pig, let me in," he says. "No, Mr. Wolf," says the Pig. The Wolf huffs and puffs, and blows the house down.

The little Pig runs to the stick house.



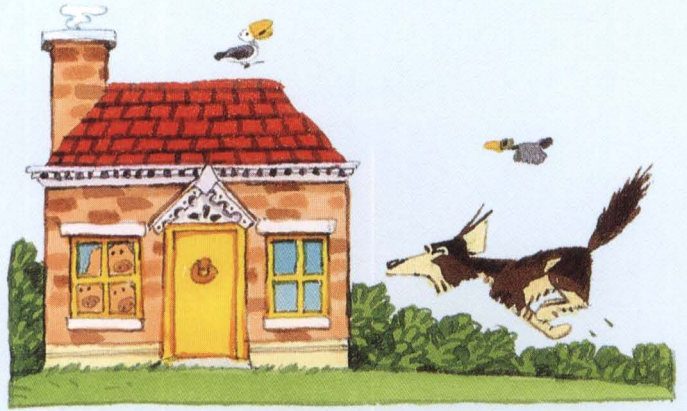
Soon the Wolf comes to the door. "Little Pigs, let me in," he says. "No, no, we won't, Mr. Wolf," say the two little Pigs.

The Wolf jumps onto the roof.



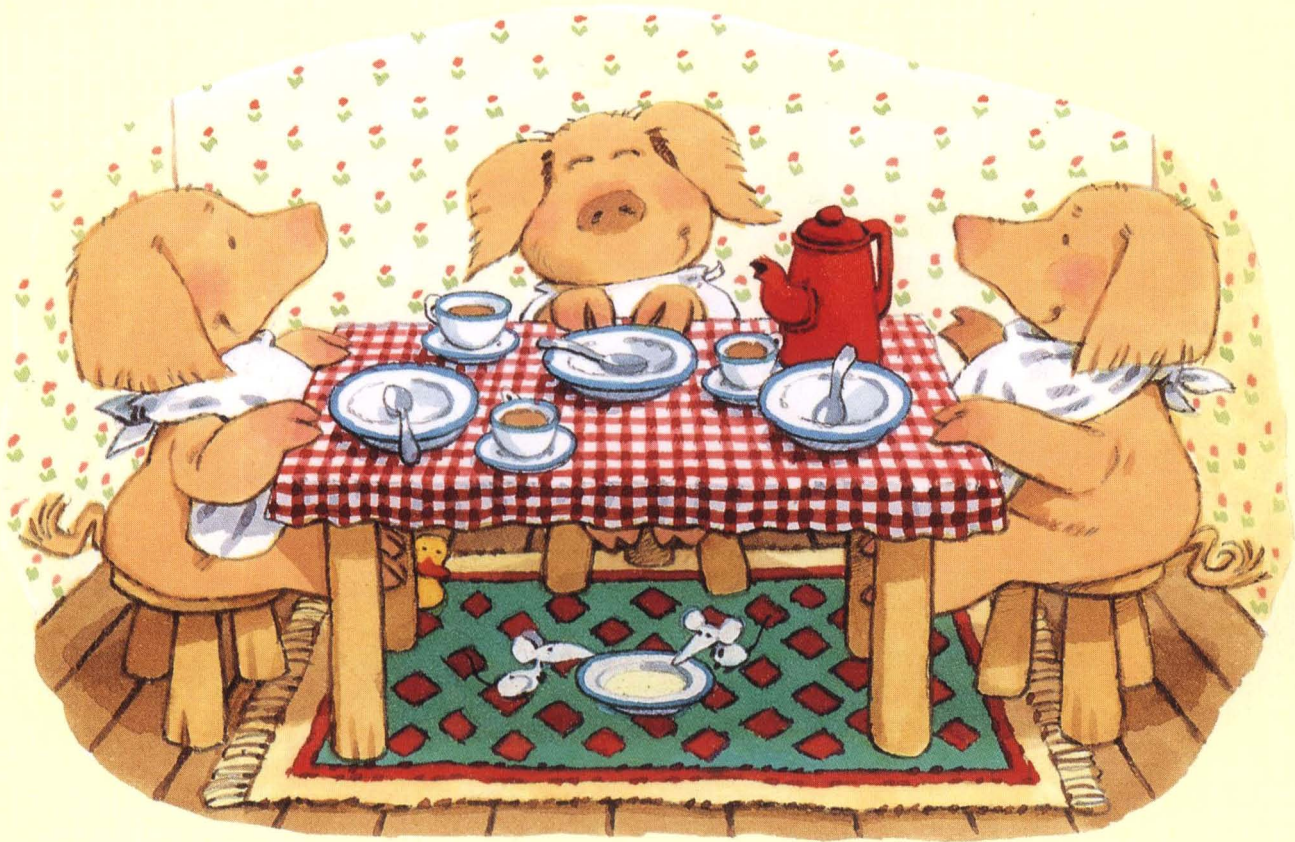
He looks down the chimney. The three little Pigs put a big pot of water on the stove. "We're ready now," says one.
