Fall Planting

Fall is time for planting some and digging up others. Make sure prepare the soil properly and to plant your



Fall is time for spring planting

bulbs at a depth of 12". There are two of types bulbs: Teardrop and Plant Flat. teardrop bulbs (tulips, daffodils,

and hyacinth) with their tips facing up. Flat bulbs should be planted with the flat side facing up. Remember, when unsure, plant sideways. Bulbs that are popular and have a healthy history in our area include the following: Hardy Amaryllis, Crocus, Hyacinth, and Lilies. Make sure to plant your bulbs in a sunny location that is protected from the harsh rays of the midday sun. Beware of the squirrels. They tend to lie in wait and watch while you plant their dinner!

Protect your tender bulbs against harsh winter conditions by covering the area with a good layer of mulch. If you plan to dig up your bulbs for the winter, store them in a dry, cool, shady place away from animals. Check at regular intervals during the winter months, discarding any that have rotted and adding a little moisture to those that look dried out.

Pushing up Pansies

Don't forget about the beautiful and hearty daisies that add zing and life to the doldrums of winter. Did you know they are edible? Use them as an attractive and green decoration on cakes and toss them in your salad.

Fall Vegetables

Spinach and garlic, of course! What a great combination. Imagine inviting your neighbors over for a savory soup or delicious homemade pizza created with fresh spinach and garlic! You might also try a spinach and chicken pasta dish enhanced by the garlic flavor!



3.02 Publications Principles of Design

A well-thought-out design and a professional layout can make ideas zoom off of a DTP document, have a major affect on how easily and effectively the message is communicated, and subtly encourage the reader to take action. Although content more often influences the outcome of the reader's decision, it is more often design which invites them to consider it in the first place.



DESIGN STRATEGIES

Keep it Simple - Too many elements discourage people from reading

Create Unity - All elements need to relate to each other and have equal importance

Create Balance - Place elements so they appear balanced without formality

Create Contrast - Contrasting colors and shapes can be used to attract attention or to emphasize

Create emphasis through
Proportion - Use graphic element's
size to illustrate importance

Create page-to-page Consistency - Use identical or similar fonts, line spacing, indention, captions, graphic elements, etc.

Use Proximity – When two or more visual elements are put close together, invariably they are grouped and seen as being related.
