Using Transitional Words and Phrases

Using transitional devices will help your essay flow and add to the overall organization of your piece.

Transitions & Justifiers:

- Can begin a sentence or join 2 sentences with a semi-colon (;)
- Are followed by a comma
- Can be the first words in a new paragraph
- Must make sense in the sentence and paragraph
- Justifier transitions are used as the first word in the last sentence in your paragraph. They "justify" your point.

Why should I use transitional words and justifier sentences?


- Using a transitional word or phrase will add *fluency* to your writing.
- A justifier sentence helps you "complete" your body paragraphs, making them feel finished.
- A justifier sentence reiterates your main focus for the paragraph, keeping you on topic.

How do I make my main idea and justifier sentence work together?

- The justifier sentence should re-state the main focus (main idea) of the body paragraph.
- Use different words than the main idea sentence of the paragraph.
- If it is a persuasive essay, make the statement persuasive.

Here is an example body paragraph. Notice the difference between the *main idea statement* and *justifier sentence*. Also note how the transitional words add fluency to the paragraph.

Equally important, I am not stressed out by school during the summer. Time Magazine once released a poll that said eighty five percent of students get paranoid by school. Whether it is homework or an essential project, students always have something to freak out about. During the summer, though, there is no homework or projects; therefore, I just relax and sleep in.
