

- Religious ministers were leaders
- SCLC Southern Christian Leadership Council
 MLK marches in Birmingham, Selma to Montgomery
- SNCC Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee
 Freedom Riders, Lunch Sit-ins
- CORE Congress of Racial Equality
 Freedom Riders

Results


- Montgomery Bus Boycott victory
- Brown v. Board of Education
- Civil Rights Act of 1964
 - Ban discrimination based on race, religion, national origin or gender (libraries, parks, washrooms, restaurants desegregated)
- Voting Rights Act of 1965
 - Eliminated literacy tests that disqualified many Blacks.
 - Federal officials could enroll voters if local govt didn't.

Southern vs. Northern Segregation?

- In the South, Jim Crow laws & some court rulings (ex. Plessy v. Ferguson) create segregation by "law" ("de jure" segregation)
- In the North, there may be no physical segregation, but peoples' minds and attitudes create "de facto" segregation (reality) by not sharing economic or social power with Blacks.

- Drop your slave name.
- Devil whites are the cause of the black condition
- Blacks must separate from white society.

 Don't work with whites, develop "Black Pride"



New Leaders Emerge –Black Power

- Black Panthers Black jackets, black berets, selfdefense militia against white police. Many shoot-outs.
- But also gave free breakfast programs, medical care, daycare centers to the Black community.
- Leaders: Huey Newton, Bobby Seale
