Final Exam Checklist

- ☐ Know and correctly spell the 4 (or sometimes 3) principal parts for all **35 verbs** in chapters 1-9.
 - Make a stack of your flash cards: do you have all verbs in hand?
- ☐ Correctly form and know how to translate all **35 verbs** in each of these different forms:
 - Infinitive
 - Imperative singular and plural
 - Know the difference between conjugations 1, 2, and 3 by looking at the principal parts
 - Know your endings, all persons and number, or our three tenses:
 - Present tense
 - Imperfect tense
 - Future tense
 - All forms of sum and possum in present, future and imperfect
- ☐ Know what these verbal terms mean:
 - Conjugate/Conjugation
 - How to find the stem of a verb
 - Voice
 - Active or Passive
 - Mood
 - Indicative
 - Imperative
 - infinitive
 - Tense
 - Present
 - Future
 - imperfect
 - Person (“Personal Endings”)
 - First, second, third
 - Singular & plural
 - Transitive vs. Intransitive
 - Complementary infinitives
- ☐ Know what noun cases mean, know how each of these is translated:
 - Nominative
 - Genitive

- Dative
- Accusative
- Ablative
- Vocative
- Apply the correct case endings to all of the nouns and adjectives assigned in the first 9 chapters.
Divide your flash cards into piles according to these and study them in groups:
 - First declension
 - Second declension
 - Third declension
- Know these noun concepts and what they do:
 - Decline/Declension
 - Know your first, second and third declension endings
 - Do you know how to find the stem of a noun?
 - Do you know the basics about Latin word order?
 - Noun gender
 - Employ the 'Agreement of Adjectives' according to:
 - Gender
 - Number
 - Case
 - Do you understand the rule for the formation of vocatives?
 - Do know which macrons are essential . . . and how they distinguish certain case endings from others?
 - Terms to know:
 - Predicate Nominatives
 - Predicate Adjectives
 - Apposition/appositives
 - Substantive adjectives
- Be aware which prepositions 'take' which cases when forming **prepositional phrases** in Latin.
- Be able to produce AND recognize the forms of...
 - Demonstrative pronouns (hic, ille, iste, etc.)
 - U.N.U.S. N.A.U.T.A. adjectives
- Know the basics about Classical Latin pronunciation
- Be ready to analyze English cognates of Latin words
- Be prepared to translate
